- University of South Australia has released a new guide to Open Educational Resources.
- James Cook University and University of Queensland have subscribed to the open publishing platform Pressbooks to create and adapt open texts. Alice Luetchford has created a Pressbooks group using Microsoft teams for individuals using Pressbooks to communicate and collaborate. - University of Southern Queensland has released its first inter-institutional open textbook with Edith Cowan University. The book, <u>Trauma Informed Behaviour Support: A Practical Guide to Developing Resilient Learners</u>, guides educators working with primary school aged children to understand trauma as well as its impact on young children's brains, behaviour, learning, and development. USQ has also released an adaption of OpenStax's <u>College Success</u> to suit the Australian University context. This newly released text is titled <u>Academic Success</u>.
- **Curtin University** Library has recently launched <u>UniSkills</u> and <u>23 Things</u> programs, a suite of open online learning resources designed to prepare students for academic success and support them in the development of digital literacy skills crucial to today's constantly changing workforce. This suite of online resources was designed with re-use in mind and is licensed under a CC BY-SA License. Amanda Bellenger and Claire Murphy have <u>written about their experiences</u> parterning with students to create these open resources.
- Monash University Malaysia Library has created <u>Open Educational Resources (OER)</u>
 Awareness Module. Thanks to Isabelle Eula for this submission.
- Congratulations to Dr Sarah Lambert from Deakin University who has published her thesis:
 Open education as social justice.
- **The Digital Dexterity** community of practice in Australia and New Zealand has established a group in OER Commons to create and share resources that enhance digital dexterity of staff and students in tertiary education.
- **RMIT** has a new open textbook adoption for Semester 1 2021: <u>Boundless Physics</u> for the course <u>Physics for Leaders</u>. RMIT is also developing two toolkits: *Open Publishing for Academic Authors*, and *OER Capability Building*.

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International news

- New strategy: Creative Commons has released a <u>new strategy</u>.
- **Public Domain Day**: January 1, 2021 was Public Domain Day: Works from 1925 are open to all! Here is <u>list of works</u> that have just entered the Public Domain.
- **News from UNESCO**: After formally adopting an OER Recommendation at the end of 2019, UNESCO was poised to draw connections between the challenges created by the pandemic and the opportunities of OER, issuing a joint call for action and guidance for using OER during school closures. The OECD released a report entitled <u>The Impact of COVID-19 on Education</u> outlining the impact of the pandemic on the world's educational systems.
- Racial justice and equity in open education: The Black Lives Matter movement and protests over the killing of Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, George Floyd and others in 2020 are now considered by many to be the largest civil rights movement in U.S. history. In light of these events, many organisations in the open education community have renewed, strengthened, or created commitments to anti-racist work in education. These include The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation's \$15 million pledge to support organisations working to combat systemic racism and recent award to the Community College Consortium for OER (CCCOER) for an Open for Anti-Racism (OFAR) Project for the California community colleges. Program officer Angela DeBarger also wrote a powerful articulation of the Foundation's approach to systemic racism in open education.
- Open Education Week: Open Education Week is a month away! Organised by Open Education Global and held from March 1-7, institutions, organisations and individuals from around the world committed to the ideals of Open Education are welcome to join and contribute. Participation is free, and there are many different ways to engage. Check out the OE Week page for more info and register your local event, and be sure to browse their library of OE Week resources that have been compiled over the years. We hope to (virtually) see you there!
- **K-12:** The K-12 community also saw major pushes for OER during the pandemic. New America has <u>curated a list of OER</u> for K-12 students, and OpenStax has been <u>supporting educators</u> by sharing resources (such as this list of <u>free and open resources for K-12</u>) and facilitating conversations about OER. Countless school districts have also promoted the adoption of open materials to support students in their remote learning.
