### Australasian news

- Universities Australia's Learning and Teaching Repository is a relatively new crossinstitutional collection of Australian learning and teaching research. The Repository holds over 1,000 reports and related resources, including templates and links to project websites developed through Australian university partnerships, much of it funded under the auspices of the Office for Learning and Teaching (OLT) and its predecessor bodies.
- **CSIRO** moves towards Open Access for national benefit, thanks to a new transformative agreement between CSIRO Publishing and CAUL member institutions. Read more in CSIRO's latest <u>news statement</u>.
- **The University of Southern Queensland** has adapted OpenStax's <u>Anatomy and Physiology</u> text to suit the Australian tertiary curriculum. The Australian edition is titled <u>Fundamentals of</u> <u>Anatomy and Physiology</u> and includes interactive quizzes, career connections and a comprehensive glossary.
- Australian Catholic University has released an exemplary <u>Open Access Policy</u> for research, including meeting F.A.I.R. goals, supporting global infrastructure of OA research and supporting 'effective and appropriate review processes and reproducibility.'
- Melanie Fillios from the University of New England and Natalie Blake from the University of Sydney have produced an open text titled <u>Animal Bones in Australian</u> <u>Archaeology</u>, which is an introductory bone identification manual written for archaeologists working in Australia. Thanks to Melanie Fillios for the submission!
- RMIT has a new open textbook adoption for <u>Semester 1 2021</u>: Biology 2e for the course Life On Earth, and a new journal article by Frank Ponte, Anne Lennox and Jennifer Hurley: <u>The</u> <u>Evolution of the Open Textbook Initiative</u>.
- The University of Sydney Library has produced <u>Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Cultural</u> <u>Protocols</u> and has licensed them under Creative Commons Attribution-NonCommercial-ShareAlike 4.0.

- Textbook Task Force takes on the high costs of learning materials at Template University.
- The Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA) Announces Support For the Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ) with <u>3-Year Collective Action Agreement</u>
- **Black History Month:** Open education can be used as a tool for combating anti-Black racism. Pressbooks has curated <u>excellent OER to celebrate Black History Month</u>.
- Happy #OEWeek: from the OEP Digest team! It's been great to see the many events happening across the globe to promote open education this month!
- **New Survey:** U.S. PIRG released the findings of their latest student survey, <u>Fixing the Broken</u> <u>Textbook Market</u>, Third Edition, on February 23rd. In September, more than 120 student volunteers asked more than 5,000 of their peers at 82 colleges and universities about their textbook buying experiences during the pandemic. Their analysis confirmed that 65% of students reported that they skipped buying textbooks due to their high cost, and 21% skipped access codes – a slight increase from last year. More concerning, however, students who had trouble meeting their basic needs also were struggling to fully participate in class: 38% of foodinsecure students had skipped buying an access code.
