• How Open Education enables culturally responsive teaching:

With <u>culturally responsive teaching</u> being a major topic of conversation across the nation, it has become more noticeable that there is a lack of culturally relevant educational materials for students to use. One way around this challenge of finding culturally relevant learning materials is to look to OER. Guided by the idea that high-quality materials should be available to—and reflective of—anyone, OER are free for educators and students to use, customize, and share. Because OER are customizable, they give educators the flexibility to incorporate voices, examples, and activities that reflect their students' backgrounds and realities.

They also allow students to contribute to educational content, bringing in their own experiences and knowledge. Several of the community colleges in Achieving the Dream's (ATD) nationwide network are leveraging both CRT and OER to promote student success and equity.

One example is Northeast State Community College in Tennessee, which has launched a new course called <u>Reclaiming Our Past: The Truth about Tennessee</u>.

- Sustainable Development Goals: The Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Academy and Creative Commons have partnered to <u>openly license educational</u> resources to help the public learn about and solve the SDGs.
- **H5P OER Hub:** Have read about the <u>H5P OER Hub</u> which is almost complete.
- York University (US) <u>teaching all Psych 102 courses using open/zero cost materials</u>. The department voted to make the switch to open not only to save students money but also to improve retention and student educational success. Supported by funds from a CUNY OER grant, this switch is likely to save students tens of thousands of dollars.
- The San Mateo Community College District (US) has moved towards
 <u>tuition-free college with the aim of reducing all costs of attending towards zero</u>.
 Building on existing state programs, San Mateo plans to invest over \$6 million to reach
 their goals and expand access to their institutions.
 The investment will also expand the existing zero-textbook-cost degree programs.

- OER Accessibility Evaluation rubric: Affordable Learning Georgia released a rubric to help faculty, librarians, course designers and other open education stakeholders to evaluate the accessibility of the open materials they are using or creating. The rubric contains three sections: open access, digital access, and pedagogical access. Individuals using the rubric will also have the option to share their results openly allowing other educators to benefit from their results.
