- Congratulations to the University of Queensland for publishing their first open texts in Pressbooks: <u>Airbnb Before, During and After COVID-19</u>, <u>JUNTXS: Introductory Spanish</u>, and <u>+JUNTXS: Intermediate Spanish</u>
- Congratulations to **La Trobe University** for publishing a new open text in the La Trobe eBureau: <u>Australian pulps 1939–1959: You go high, we go low</u> by Stuart Kells. Kells examines: the circumstances that gave rise to this field of "low literature"; the major publishers, artists, and authors; and the different expressions of pulp genre: crime, westerns, sci-fi, romance and "weird tales". Filled with vividly illustrated covers, it provides a valuable record of mostly overlooked Australian writers and the culture surrounding their production.
- The **University of Technology Sydney** (UTS) hosted a series on Open Educational Resources in March, featuring Dr David Wiley (USA), Dr David Porter (Canada) and Adrian Stagg (Australia). UTS summarised the series in a three-part blog, embedding the recordings:

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International news

- **OER adoption**: BCcampus has created an <u>OER adoption form</u> and an <u>Open Textbook</u> adoption form
- UNESCO recommendation: The intergovernmental Special Committee Meeting of UNESCO approved the draft text of a <u>Recommendation on Open Science</u>.
 The Recommendation outlines common definitions, shared values, principles and standards for Open Science at the international level, and proposes a set of actions conducive to a fair and equitable operationalisation of Open Science at individual, institutional, national, regional and international levels.
 - The Recommendation explicitly recognises OER within the definition of Open Scientific Knowledge, building on the UNESCO Recommendation on Open Educational Resources adopted in 2019.
- **Read the fine print**: SPARC has released a new resource about the legal agreements behind automatic textbook billing programs. Their <u>Automatic Textbook Billing Contract Library</u> offers a structured breakdown of more than 70 contracts with major vendors obtained through public records requests. The library includes contracts previously published by US PIRG, whose <u>2020 report</u> highlights the differences between OER and 'inclusive access' style programs.
